This is always a popular and fun ride/event. The weather should be mild and perfect for this time of year, but please bring a sweater or jacket just in case.



I Used To Own An Austin Healey

PART THREE... Heading Home...Friday morning, six cars in caravan departed the Shilo Inn, Ocean Shores, Washington, in light rain. The clouds lingered but the air became drier we drove into Oregon. A few of the scenic towns in Northern Oregon that we passed on our southward jour-

ney, along HWY 101 were Hoquium, an old mill town with cute houses, Raymond- on the willapa, and South Bend with lots of seafood processing plants. All before we reached Astoria! South of Astoria we saw, but did not stop at, Outlet stores, and a live butterfly Garden at Seaside, Ecola State Beach Park, Nehalem, Nehalem River and Neath

Nehalem Bay Winery, Wheeler with a population of 300, Rockaway Beach, population 1000, with a Cyber Cafe and Garibaldi, a cute town that was having some sort of festival. Bazzio's Restaurant was supposed to be a good place to eat in Garibaldi, according to the gas station attendant. And their parking lot was friendly to Healey mufflers. But in light of it being Friday, and the beginning of the town fair, it wasn't available to us. Lunch would be at Tillimook.

Tillamook has the most relaxed cows we've ever seen. It also has the Locomotion Restaurant filled with "class of 58" memorabilia. We





were served huge platters of hamburgers, fries, salads, etc. Our leisurely lunch was followed with a notso- leisurely WAIT to get out of their parking lot.

Photopps were everywhere on this trip. For example, the viewpoint at Twin Rocks between Barview and Garibaldi, Oregon, heading south, the north-facing hill's topography and foliage spectacular in July. The lighthouse between Agate Beach and Yaquina Head would be quite picturesque on a clear day. The beach between Cummins Creek and Cape Perpetua is typically spectacular with the morning sun on it. Some



photos - warning of CONGESTION were everywhere....an oxymoron? I think they were trying to warn us of merging traffic, but was not a problem. The unique names of shops, such as "Hail Mary's Expresso".

Our overnight stop, southward, as well as northward, was the Shilo Inn Newport, Oregon. Steve Cloyes arrived at Gold Beach ahead of us. So while we were filling our gas tanks, and visiting the restrooms, he drove

Because the Curry County Fair was in progress, we decided against having lunch in Gold Beach at the same restaurant we visited on our trip northward, The Chowderhead. We were sad to miss their "house dressing" made with smoked salmon with a distinctly smokey flavor. Instead, we had lunch at a little coffee shop called the flying Gull adjourning a Best Western in Brookings. It was better than fast food.

At 2:40 p.m. we crossed the border back into California. If you missed the border sign, you could tell by looking at the price of fuel: every grade was at least \$0.15/gallon higher.

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CAR OF THE YEAR (COTY) AWARD

Opportunities to collect COTY points include any car-related events (shows, drives, rallies, etc.) sponsored by an official organization (other car clubs, auto museum, city chambers of commerce, charities, etc.) where you participate with your Healey. Events need not be listed in the Club's newsletter to earn points.

The participant is responsible for providing proof of participation (entrance fee receipt, photo, corroboration from other club members etc.) to the Coty Recorder, Rick Snover (619-980-4194 ricksnover@earthlink.net) within 30 days after the event. AHCSD events will have a sign-in sheet that will be forwarded to the recorder. For members with multiple eligible vehicles, be sure to indicate which one(s) you drove.

Coty points currently approved by the Board are: AHCSD Meetings & Tech Sessions 4pts; AHCSD Driving Events, Parties, etc. 6pts; AHCSD Healeys on the Green 8pts; California Healey Week, Healey Rendezvous and Austin Healey Conclave 16pts; S.D. British Car Day and Rolling B.C.D. 10pts; other multi-day British-themed events 8pts; other multi-day events 4pts; other one-day British-themed events 4pts; other one-day events 2pts. Other non-Healey British-built cars earn half points, but are not eligible to win the award.

All points received during the year by all members will be worth a discount towards the purchase of AHCSD regalia during the subsequent year. The total point leader at the end of the year will receive the coveted CAR OF THE YEAR badge for display on their Healey for the following year.
