

I Used To Own An Austin Healey

PART FOUR...I used to own an Austin ≠... The end of the 2000 Rendezvous...

Our –plan to drive down Hwy 280 to Hwy 85 and then to Hwy 17. Warren almost got run off the road by a women driving AM(y) B(onnet0 near the junction to Hwy 85 South. By the time e he got peeled off to Hwy 85 North, got turned around and headed south on Hwy 85North, got turned around and headed south on Hwy 85, he couldn't reach us on the walkie-talkie. We were out of range.

When we realized that Warren was not behind us, we pulled into an emergency lane off the freeway and waited for ten minutes for him. No Warren. Then we decided it would be safer to get off the road where it stopped being the freeway at Hwy 17. We waited another 15 minutes. Still no Warren. WE kept calling on the FRS wakie-talkie, but with a two mile range, we never got together by radio.

Later, after many hours, when we finally got back together with Warren at our motel in San Luis Obispo, we realized we really should have exchanged cell phone numbers and turned on our cell phones when we realized we were out of range on the FRS's.

The day turned out to be memorable for us and for Warren, even though we didn't share the activities. We had discussed

earlier on the trip about visiting Nepenthe Restaurant, and old historic hangout for members of the Beat generation. in Big Sur. We felt sure we would certainly meet up with Warren there, if not before. Roland and I stopped and enjoyed the view, had coffee and a snack, visited the gift shop, and still no Warren. (There was some discussion earlier at breakfast, of driving straight through to San Diego without a stop in San Luis Obispo overnight. After two hours, we began to think Warren had gone home and would leave a message for us at the motel. We called the motel in SLO and asked if there were any messages for us. No messages yet.

Warren's day started badly, but it turned out to

be one of the most fun days he'd ever spent. (See his article, reprinted following this on page----, to bring the conclu-



sion of I used to own an Austin Healey.) By 5:00 Monday afternoon when Roland and I arrived at our motel in San Luis Obispo, we were quite concerned about Warren and decided to call his home to find out if he called there. We didn't want to alarm Lynn, his wife, but we needed to know if we could stop worrying. No, Lynn had not heard from Warren.

You can imagine the kind of reception Warren Received when we finally got together! After calling home to

reassure his wife that he was safe and back together with us, we all had a good laugh and lots of stories to tell about our adventuresome day. We celebrated our reunion with a fabulous Cajun dinner of fried catfish at Bon Temps Creole Cafe, next door to our motel. After a long day of sitting in cars and a delicious dinner of fried catfish, craw-fish etouffe, gumbo, , ya-ya, red beans and rice, and cornbread to die for, we needed



some exercise. We walked for a mile or so before returning to our rooms for a good nights sleep. (We tried to walk every evening after dinner, while traveling to clear our heads as well as flex sore new muscles.

Tuesday night August 1st was our last night on the road. We had breakfast and fueled up the cars and left San Luis Obispo by 8:15 a.m. and Roland and I arrived at our house at 3:15 p.m.. Now, thats the kind of precision driving we experienced most days.

Around 11:15 a.m. we were driving through Thousand Oaks in 100+ degree heat. The water temperature in our engines was climbing - ours was 190 degrees. Warrens was 200 degrees. We were in bumper traffic: we couldn't stop for fear of a vapor lock; the batteries in our walkie- talkies were going dead. Time for a Coke.

Finally, by 12:30 p.m., we were on the Toll Road from Hwy 405 to Hwy 5 in Orange County. With a fuel stop and a delightful lunch at Cedar Creek Inn in San Juan Capistrano, we were refreshed once again to make the last 1 or 2 hours to HOME. (Warren received the award at Rendezvous for driving the greatest distance to the meet!)

We learned many things from this trip:

- 1. There's always at least one more thing to do than you have time to get it done.
- 2. If you have the tools and parts to fix a certain problem, then you won't need them. If you decide something is too unlikely to break or too expensive to tote, watch out.
- 3. Two (or more) Healeys are a heck of a lot better than one on a long trip.. But decide what speed you are going to try and maintain.
- 4. Have radio communication between/ among all the cars. Make sure everyone is connected by smart phones. (*This may sound dated as it was before smart phones-ed.*)

- 5. Have a "drop dead" plan where to meet or whom to contact in emergencies
- 6. When a breakdown occurs, try to get your head on straight before grabbing tools and diving under the hood. Give your brain time to feed you some suggestions. Stop and have some water. Much of the time if it happens fast, it can be fixed fast- if you can figure out the problem.
- 7. In hot weather, zip-out rear windows are the best thing since clouds were invented.
- 8. Six to seven hours driving time per day appears to be a sustainable maximum for 'mature' drivers in Healeys. Eight to ten hours a day is doable, but it's going to be a drag several days out. Cut yourself some slack. Stop periodically, stretch and have a water.



- 9. Car covers are a definite maybe. We used ours over night while traveling, except when the weather was too wet..A cover keeps the idly curious from exploring a car with no door locks.
- 10. Keep your cool in an emergency. Above all, keep a sense of humor...And have fun...On the road is part of the experience, isn't it?...


On The Road To Rendezvous 2000

One of the nice things about traveling is you meet people who do things differently. We, in San Diego, get nervous when four drops of rain hit the pavement and are ready to call a driving event off. 

THE UNLUCKIEST HEALEY - EVER or WAS IT JINXED?

I owned what was most likely the unluckiest Austin-Healey ever built. It was plagued by incident after incident that were mostly not the fault of the owner - either that, or it was In 1961, when I purchased a black 1960 Austin-Healey 3000 from my boss, It already had been involved in a number of unlucky incidents.

My boss was driving on the Pennsylvania Turnpike, at about 70 MPH, when a pheasant flew in front of the car and went through the windshield. The windshield shattered and his face was cut severely. Fortunately, he wore glasses and his eyes were saved from any damage. Next, he was driving in town when a boy playing baseball hit the ball which landed on the aluminum shroud and dented it.


The first weekend after purchasing the car, I drove to the New Jersey shore to visit some friends. While parked on the street, the parking brake on a car in a driveway failed and the car rolled down the driveway and across the street into my right hand door. (First incident for me.)

While getting gas, an early 1950's Dodge backed up into my front end – more damage. The driver claimed that he didn't

see me. He could have driven forward out of the station, but he decided to back up. The impact must have misaligned the windshield posts, as I had a number of windshields crack ever-after.

While driving home one evening, in the rain, a car pulled up to the stop sign on a side street. The driver stopped and then drove into the left side of the car, damaging the door and front fender, along with cracking the windshield (again). He claimed that he didn't see me, even though my headlights were on at the time.

I attended my first US Grand Prix at Watkins Glen with a friend. As usual, it had been raining and the infield was wet. My friend believed he could make it through the INFAMOUS BOG, even though a Healey has only about a 4 inch ground clearance. The Healey bottomed out on the mud. While pushing the car out, of course the tires spun and I was covered with mud. We later found some friends and were able to sleep under their trailer, out of the rain. I never was able to get all the mud off the bottom of the car. While returning home after the race, on the PA Turnpike, my friend decided to see if a Healey really would do 120 MPH. It did reach an

The next incident happened while I was driving home from a

friend's house at night. A driver, who smelled of alcohol, came through a stop sign and hit my right front fender and door. More damage!

The National Level, March Lion Rallye was presented by the South Jersey Region of the SCCA. I decided to try my first National Rallye. The 15 year old daughter of someone who worked with a friend's father was a little car crazy. She had recordings of cars racing at various tracks and she

wanted to go on a drive in a sports car. The person I wanted to navigate was unavailable, so I took her along on her first rallye which was known to be very difficult. Well, with the unlucky Healey, we had a flat tire, a water hose broke and the fan belt came off too many times to count By the time we made it to the banquet at the end, we were too late to claim the Hard Luck award. She never rode with me again.

All these problems were in addition to the usual Healey issues of broken spokes on 48 spoke wheel rims, electrical failures, refusal to start in very cold or wet weather, breaking

shock absorber mounts and leaking water in the rain.

By the time I traded the car for a 1964 MG Midget, after still another shock mount failure, the only panel that had not been hit or damaged was the left rear fender. The saga of the Midget is a whole different story that will have to wait for another time.

I originally fell in love with British Sports Cars after hearing the sound of my bosses' Austin-Healey. Ever since, I have owned a British Sports Car, with the exception of my time on active duty in the Navy. These have included several MGB's, an MG Midget and a Jensen Healey. In 1991, I was looking for an MG to restore, when I found another 1960 Austin-Healey 3000 at a reasonable price. I was in love again. (I never really fell out of love for

Healeys.) The car was restored to Concours level for the 1999 International meet held here in San Diego. Most of the problems that plagued the early cars have since been corrected and my current Healey is now very reliable.



I have now had my second Austin-Healey for almost 30 years and I still enjoy driving it.

However, I have never again owned a black car.

The participant is responsible for providing proof of participation (entrance fee receipt, photo, corroboration from other club members etc.) to the Coty Recorder, Rick Snover (619-980-4194 ricksnover@earthlink.net) within 30 days after the event. AHCSD events will have a sign-in sheet that will be forwarded to the recorder. For members with multiple eligible vehicles, be sure to indicate which one(s) you drove.

Coty points currently approved by the Board are: AHCSD Meetings & Tech Sessions 4pts; AHCSD Driving Events, Parties, etc. 6pts; AHCSD Healeys on the Green 8pts; California Healey Week, Healey Rendezvous and Austin Healey Conclave 16pts; S.D. British Car Day and Rolling B.C.D. 10pts; other multi-day British-themed events 8pts; other multi-day events 4pts; other one-day British-themed events 4pts; other one-day events 2pts. Other non-Healey British-built cars earn half points, but are not eligible to win the award.

All points received during the year by all members will be worth a discount towards the purchase of AHCSD regalia during the subsequent year. The total point leader at the end of the year will receive the coveted CAR OF THE YEAR badge for display on their Healey for the following year.


