From The Editor:



The drive to the Bates Nut Farm was a surreal experience for me. I was reminiscing of our own family outing to the farm many years ago as I was doing the full page of the event for the newsletter...make that returning to my twilight zone...As

a matter of fact when Sundays' real time rural traffic came to a stand still, was I still hoping for a slow moving wagon full of pumpkins and kids enjoying a hay ride back to the farm...?

Many, if not most of todays families attending the Farm, Sunday, may never have had the real experience of being raised on a real working family farm. The Bates Farm is as good as any made for media commercial featuring home made candy, pie, hot dogs, cold drinks, petting animals, yada, yada, yada...The following is the real deal from my childhood, just as nostalgic, for me, anyway...

I was raised on a family farm of citrus and chickens. This is a story of the 40's coming out of the depression. Citrus was a large part of our family's income, Our grove was a Sunkist grove. We belonged to the Sunkist association. Picking the Naval and Valencia oranges requires two picking times. The Valencia oranges are a late season fruit. Oranges were harvested by itinerant pickers that I never made much of a connection with, at the time, as I was too young...

Years later, upon seeing the John Steinbeck movie, **The Grapes of Wrath**, it hit me...People like the Joads' would pick our citrus. I read Tortilla Flats in high school but never The Grapes of Wrath. I recall, distinctly that our pickers would arrive in old cars and trucks, just like the Joads' and pick citrus in season. The whole family would pick as they were paid so much per lug box of oranges, lemons, and limes. They were in our groves until the citrus was picked. Their cars and trucks were rusty


Claires' Sprite Gets Fresh Carbs

Many of us decided to wade into the chaos to find restrooms, listen to music at the bandstand, stand in line for food, or brave the hordes in the huge store for candy, nuts, cold drinks and all kinds of snacks. I have to say the line at the fudge counter, where they had a dozen different kinds was well worth the wait. Homemade and delicious it satisfied my sweet tooth. Staying together as a large group was just not possible, but a few of us enjoyed feeding corn to the chickens, goats and sheep in the petting zoo and wandering through the rows of pumpkins. After a while we headed back to the cars

for the ride home. As we were getting ready to leave members Kevin and Alejandra Schumacher with son AJ who happened to be visiting Bates spotted the cars and came over to say Hi.

The morning ride through north county and around Lake Wohlford was scenic, fun and easy. It would appear however that even though information received by phone from Bates Nut Farm indicated "there would be some traffic", the number of cars going to Bates from either direction was EPIC! Deciding to exit the opposite way we came in there was still 2 to 3 miles of cars still in line to enter. It seems everyone had to get there - be there that day. Even with the traffic and crowds a good day.

and they lived in them and tents while picking. One car had been a touring car and big enough that a mattress replaced the back seat. They would park their cars and trucks in between the rows of trees and would build cooking fires of orange tree pruning and coal briquettes in the smudge pots that my dad would use to keep the fruit from freezing as it got pretty cold in the lower parts of El Cajon Valley as the fruit was maturing. My folks treated them fairly and there was never a problem as in the movie. As a matter of fact, one of the women needed some medical attention and my mom took her up to the house and called our family doctor for her. There is no question that it was a desperate time for some, but it really wasn't easy time for any...

Actually, in many respects my family was not too many notches above the Joads, as this was the tail end of the depression. We did live on, and own, our farm. And we did eat a lot of chicken and home made bread. And we had two milk cows, Susie and Erma. Actually, we lived pretty good for the times. My mom baked deep dish cottage cheese custard cake with a graham cracker and brown sugar crust with plenty of real butter, courtesy Susie and Erma, and later Vicie... that was out of this world...We did have patches on our pants and wear home made shirts that my grandmother made. And which I hated. She would make the collars like girls blouses not like boys shirts, which are difficult to sew....And little ingrate that I was, I knew the difference, and it bothered me. Especially as I would have to wear that damn shirt on special occasions... And everyone would comment on how cute the shirts looked on us...ugg...

Back to the Joads... One of the migrant pickers families' had a son who was about four or five years older that Bill and I. I was between five and six at the time. And he was what we would now call a bully...I would have called him something else, but I was still learning to swear. One day he hit me for some reason. Not really hard, but I was too small to hit him back. It may have been accidentally in play. But I took it personally...because he laughed as it was a joke to him.


Next to the long chicken brooder barn and work shop, there was a shed, at right angle to the brooder barn that had room for three cars. The shed and barn made a large L shape. We had a 1935 ford V8 sedan, a Fordson tractor and old Model A truck. Next to the truck, in a corner of the shed was an old rusty double barrel hammer shot gun with one broken hammer. The gun could not shoot, but the bully didn't know that. So I grabbed the shotgun and proceeded to chase the jerk down between the rows of orange trees. I was doing my best, cussing him out as I was learning to swear pretty good,

by now from listening to some of my dads friends when they would meet at Tom Kings Feed Store or WD Halls in the black smiths shop...He was screaming at the top of his lungs... His dad heard him screaming and saw me with the shotgun. He grabbed me and the gun and took me up to the house to mom. I thought I was in real trouble but nothing happened, to my relief, as mom usually meted out punishment. I can now imagine my dad laughing in the evening when my mom told him at adult supper, after we kids were in bed...

About this time, Pearl Harbor had already been bombed and the U.S. Army was bivouaced down below the house adjacent to the lemon and lime groves. They actually moved in where the WPA, CCC camp had been before the war. The CCC boys had built a large drainage ditch diagonally across the about sixty acre ranch property with cobble stones that people still find in their yards from La Mesa up through Poway today.

These smooth round polished stones that people dig up in their gardens and flower beds are actually called glacial till. They are left over from the last ice age that covered much of this part of the United States, about twenty five thousand years or more ago. As the glaciers melted, the round rock till was at the bottom of the glacier and was polished smooth as the glacier moved. Till is a giant monument to climate change that we hear so much about. The till is the final resting place of the glacier that ended in San Diego. And we survived it and without taxes too...

Returning to our army camp... I would estimate the total camp was not large, perhaps fourty or fifty soldiers. They slept in military tents. My favorite spot was the camp kitchen. The cook would bake bread for the soldiers mess. He was a kindly guy, who greated Bill and I, and would give us a slice of fresh baked bread with butter. Looking back, I am guessing they were placed strategically, after the war started, to protect the homeland. Many people thought the invasion of Hawaii would reach the west coast of America. There were three round machine gun dugouts that were inter connected with trenches at least five or more feet deep edged with sand bags. The dugouts had a raised earth circle in the center with a wood platform for machine guns. The ammunition cans were sometimes kept in the circular dugouts. The machine guns were kept where they could be kept away from my brother Bill and I, ...because you can only imagine what that would lead to, right?...And thats how it was on our farm...through five and six year old eyes... Happy Thanksgiving...Warren





AHCSD events will have a sign-in sheet that will be forwarded to the recorder. For members with multiple eligible vehicles, be sure to indicate which one(s) you drove.

COTY points currently approved by the Board are: AHCSD Meetings & Tech Sessions 4pts; AHCSD Driving Events, Parties, etc. 6pts; AHCSD Healeys on the Green 8pts; California Healey Week, Healey Rendezvous and Austin Healey Conclave 16pts; S.D. British Car Day and Rolling B.C.D. 10pts; other multi-day British-themed events 8pts; other multi-day events 4pts; other one-day British-themed events 4pts; other one-day events 2pts. Other non-Healey British-built cars earn half points, but are not eligible to win the award.

All points received during the year by all members will be worth a discount towards the purchase of AHCSD regalia during the subsequent year. The total point leader at the end of the year will receive the coveted CAR OF THE YEAR badge for display on their Healey for the following year.
